First assessment: devastating fire causes damage totalling two million euros

Following the devastating fire that destroyed almost all the medical equipment of our rescue helicopters and ambulance jets this morning, initial figures on the extent of the damage can now be provided.

According to an initial, preliminary estimate by the LAR experts, the damage amounts to around two million euros. The devastating fire destroyed defibrillators, ventilators and ECG equipment, among other devices. In addition, the baby incubators co-developed by LAR, which are unique in the world and cost approximately 200,000 euros each, were exposed to the fire.

With approximately 190 employees, LAR ensures the highest standards in the areas of medicine, technology and flight operations and is available with its alarm centre 24/7 and 365 days a year.
